Bereavement Support Payments

If your spouse or civil partner died in the last 21 months, you may be able to get Bereavement Support Payments.



Unmarried partners with dependent children can also claim Bereavement Support.

With this, you receive a lump sum of;

- £2,500 standard rate,
- £3,500 higher rate.

This does not have to be used for funeral costs, but you may chose to use some of this towards the costs of the funeral.

It does not replace the Funeral Expenses Payment which you can claim too if you get a qualifying benefit. You must claim within 3 months of your partner's death to get the full amount.

Welfare Funerals

If someone without a family dies, or the family is unable to pay for the funeral, the council has to arrange a welfare funeral. This is usually a basic funeral at a crematorium. Contact your local council to find out more.

Stoke-on-Trent City Council provide a 20 minute service at Carmountside Crematorium, organised by local funeral directors, who will discuss arrangements.

Direct Cremation Funerals

A direct cremation is a cheaper than a traditional funeral, as there is no service or ceremony before the cremation and no hearse or flowers. Some funeral directors offer this for about £1,000.

You can have a direct cremation funeral without having a funeral director to cut the costs further, but you will have to make all the arrangements yourself.

If a Child has Died

The Children's Funeral Fund for England can help to pay for some of the costs of a funeral for a child under 18 or a baby stillborn after the 24th week of pregnancy. It is not meanstested. The burial or cremation must take place in England. The fees for the burial or cremation can be claimed directly by the burial or cremation provider - you should not be charged. Claims must be made within 6 months of the funeral.

Help with funeral costs

This leaflet looks at the financial help available if someone close to you dies and you are responsible for organising their funeral.

Funeral Expenses Payment

If you get one of these benefits, you might get a Funeral Expenses Payment from the DWP to help towards the cost of the funeral.

- Universal Credit,
- Income Support;
- Income-based JSA;
- Income-related ESA;
- Pension Credit;
- Child Tax Credit;
- Working Tax Credit with a disability element;
- Housing Benefit;
- Council Tax Support.

A Funeral Expenses Payment is a grant which you do not need to pay back.

To qualify for a Funeral Expenses Payment you must be:

- the partner of the person who has died,
- a close relative or close friend of the person who has died,
- the parent of a baby stillborn after 24 weeks of pregnancy,
- the parent or person responsible for a child who has died, who was under 16, or under 20 and in approved education or training.

Are You Responsible for the Funeral?

The DWP will only give you a Funeral Expenses Payment if they accept that you should be responsible for the funeral.


If you were the partner of the person who died and were living with them at the time, or immediately before one of you had to move permanently into a care home, you are automatically the responsible person.

If you claim as a close relative or friend, the DWP will check to see whether the person who died had a partner or grown-up child who is not getting one of the qualifying benefits. If so, the DWP will usually decide that person is responsible for the funeral and will not give you a Funeral Expenses Payment.

They should not do this if the close relative was estranged from the person who died.

If the person who died had no close relatives, the DWP will check to see if there was anyone else who was as close to them as you, or closer, who doesn't get benefits.

If so, they may decide that person is responsible for the funeral.



What does the Funeral Payment Cover?

The basic grant should pay the full cost of:

- burial fees for a particular plot;
- cremation fees, including the cost of the doctor's certificate;
- travel to arrange or go to the funeral;
- the cost of moving the body within the UK, if it's being moved more than 50 miles;



• death certificates or other documents

You can also get up to £1,000 towards other funeral expenses, such as funeral director's fees, flowers or the coffin.

The payment will not usually cover all of the costs of the funeral.

If the person who died had any assets, such as savings or property, or a funeral plan or insurance, the value of these will be deducted from the final grant.

You need to claim within 3 months of the funeral.
